

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), P.L. 108-446

Under the requirements of IDEA, P.L. 108-446, the Bureau of Indian Education receives appropriated funding from the Office of Special Education for distribution to tribes, tribal organizations or consortia. The purpose is to "assist" states in <u>child find, screening, parent</u> <u>training and other procedures for early</u> <u>identification and intervention</u>. All Tribal programs that receive funds must have a bureau funded school on the reservation.

Part C (birth - 2 yrs. old) of IDEA is for the early identification of infants and toddlers who are "at risk of a developmental delay if early intervention services were not provided."

Part B (3 - 5 yrs. old) of IDEA is for preschool children in providing a free and appropriate public education (FAPE) for children with disabilities. The use of funds for this age group is to "assist" States and allow for the provision of direct services.

The Early Years

vurrent research emphasizes the early years as \checkmark the most critical periods in a child's life. "Developmental milestones" are periods of a child's life that will establish the intellectual, social, emotional, and motor developmental foundations. All children develop differently and at their own pace. These developmental milestones indicate when a child is expected to move on to the next stage of development.

Please contact your tribal or state early childhood program if you have the following concerns:

- A child having difficulty with motor • development (i.e.: crawling, walking).
- If you have a concern about a child's hearing or • speech.
- If you think a family could benefit from early • intervention services.

Each community or school conducts ongoing activities called "Child Find." These activities are designed to help families in the early identification and support of healthy development. Participating in "Child Find" insures that a child will be able to progress and receive needed services early.

You can support, identify and, intervene early in a child's life.
