Three Child Outcomes and Infant Developmental Inventory Items

A precursor skill for functional behaviors may not be appropriate or expected for some children with motor impairments.

Items Not Addressed

Areas that are not precursor to or components of, any specific outcome were not included in the crosswalk:

Gross Motor

- **18 months:** Kicks ball forward

Fine motor

- **13 months:** Builds tower of two or more blocks
- **18 months:** Builds a tower of 4 or more blocks

Outcome 1: Positive Social-Emotional Skills (including social relationships)

Social

Birth–1 month, 4–18months

- Social smile
- Reacts differently to strangers
- Plays peek-a-boo
- Waves “Bye, Bye”
- Wants doll, teddy bear or blanket in bed

Language

5–6 months

- Responds to voice, turns head toward voice
- Responds to name, turns and looks

Outcome 2: Acquisition and Use of Knowledge and Skills

Social

2–3 months

- Recognizes mother
- Recognizes familiar adults

Self-Help

Birth–3 months, 6 months

- Alert: interested in sights and sounds
- Reacts to sight of bottle or breast
- Increases activity when shown toy, Looks for object after it disappears from sight

Fine Motor

12 months, 14–15 months

- Turns pages of books a few at a time
- Marks with crayon or pencil
- Scribbles with crayon or pencil

Language

Birth, 2–4 months, 6 months, 7–12 months, 13–18 months

- Cries
- Laughs out loud
- Babbles
- Makes sounds like dada, mama, baba
- Imitates sounds you make
- Points to things
- Uses at least ten words

Outcome 3: Use of Appropriate Behaviors to Meet Needs

Social

20–21 months

- Sometimes says “no” when interfered with

Self-Help

Birth, 4–5 months, 7–21 months

- Alert: interested in sights and sounds
- Comforts self with thumb or pacifier
- Picks up small cup with two hands
- Helps a little when being dressed
- Feeds self with a spoon

Gross Motor (*precursor skill*)

Birth–21 months

- Wiggles and kicks, Rolls from stomach to back
- Sits alone, steady
- Crawls on hands and knees
- Stands alone briefly
- Runs

Fine Motor

Birth–11 months

- Looks at objects or faces
- Holds objects put in hand
- Transfers objects from one hand to another
- Puts small objects in a cup or container

12 months, 14–15 months

- Turns pages of books a few at a time
- Marks with crayon or pencil
- Scribbles with crayon or pencil

Language

1 month, 18 months

- Cries in a special way when hungry
- Asks for food or drink using special words
